

Guide to the Neil Poppensiek Collection

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COLLECTION DESCRIPTION

This collection contains ephemera from the collections of the late Neil Poppensiek, local historian and former President of the Board of Trustees of the DeWitt Historical Society. Most importantly, it contains manuscript materials from Neil's research on Connecticut Hill in the Town of Newfield. Connecticut Hill was a tract of 16,000 acres that was originally owned by the state of Connecticut from 1800 until 1879.

It also contains other Tompkins County materials, including a research report, (possibly a high school or college paper) on the history of local school architecture. Another notable piece is the "Farmer's Twenty Year Record" of local farmer Darling A. English, dating from 1886-1908.
